The nomination for ovarian cancer as the next National Project was put forth by SI Wellington. This nomination was strongly supported by SI Rangatahi Wellington and it received overwhelming approval at the SIANZ AGM, making ovarian cancer the official National Project for 2022-2025.

Following the AGM in May 2022, a dedicated group of Soroptimists formed the National Project Team, whose primary objective is to provide support and assistance to clubs involved in the National Project.

THE NATIONAL **PROJECT** -

Education, Advocacy and Funding to Reduce the Impact of Ovarian Cancer in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Ovarian cancer is often diagnosed too late, limiting treatment options and change outcomes to reducing survival rates due to:

- Lack of awareness of the symptoms of ovarian cancer;
- Lack of funding for research;
- Patients not always being heard by medical • professionals and delays taking action;
- Access to diagnostic testing and lack of approved and funded treatments.

PROJECT **SNAPSHOT...**

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THE WHY -

- Every day, one Kiwi woman is told the devastating news they have ovarian cancer.
- Five women a week lose their lives to ovarian cancer.
- Ovarian cancer kills more Kiwi women than all of the other gynaecological cancers combined.
- There are no national guidelines for testing for and diagnosing ovarian cancer and women often wait months, or years, to receive a diagnosis.
- 1 in 3 women diagnosed have a rare ovarian cancer - rarer ovarian cancers receive even less funding and little is known about them.
- Maori women are 62% more likely to die of ovarian cancer than other ethnic groups.
- Almost half of women are diagnosed via the emergency department - in many cases, their cancer has progressed too far for treatment to be effective and 42% of these women lose their lives to ovarian cancer within a year of diagnosis.
- Women with ovarian cancer in Australia have access to 10 times more clinical trials and many more approved and funded treatments. Women with ovarian cancer in New Zealand are being left behind due to lack of funding and support.

Advocate for research and government funding

Advocate for women to be heard, and action taken, when they have symptoms

age 32, my whole life changed in an instant. I had spent TWO years going back and forth to my GP and many other doctors, trying to get answers for the persistent symptoms I was experiencing - changes in bowel motions, fatigue, frequent urination and reduced appetite. Each time I was told my symptoms were 'nothing serious' and they did not merit investigation. I felt unheard and minimised by health professionals and it was incredibly frustrating.

Until finally, I ended up in the emergency department, having urgent surgery. I woke up to a diagnosis of ovarian cancer - a disease I'd never even heard of.

Sadly, my story is not unique. It's the same story I hear over and over again when talking to other women with ovarian cancer. Before my diagnosis I thought I had my whole life ahead of me and I had a picture of what I wanted that life to look like. Suddenly, my oncologist was telling me that life would likely amount to five to fifteen years.

I decided to use that time to make a difference for women living with ovarian cancer, and those still to be diagnosed, and I founded Cure Our Ovarian Cancer in 2018 with the aim of funding research into Low Grade Serous Ovarian Cancer - the cancer I was diagnosed with. However I quickly realised there was a huge gap and so I expanded our focus to all ovarian cancers.

Cure Our Ovarian Cancer is the only dedicated ovarian cancer charity in New Zealand, and our aim is to help women with ovarian cancer live better, longer lives.

When I was diagnosed with ovarian cancer at We're committed to supporting women living with ovarian cancer by:

- Driving awareness so every New Zealander knows the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer, and women know when to advocate for themselves and push for answers
- Ensuring women living with ovarian cancer have a unified voice, along with the support they need, every step of their journey
- Advocating for women to have access to diagnostic testing, treatment options and comprehensive information about ovarian cancer
- Funding and growing ovarian cancer research in New Zealand to build our capacity for further research and clinical trials, to improve outcomes and survival rates for women living with ovarian cancer

We receive no funding from the Government, so we rely 100% on our community to raise the funds we need to run awareness campaigns, hold support groups for women, fund research grants and to advocate at a local and national government level. And we have so many more exciting things planned to make things better for women living with ovarian cancer.

That's why incredible supporters like the Soroptimist Clubs in New Zealand are so important to us. I'm so grateful for all the support we've received to date, and for every fundraising activity that's been held so far. Thank you! I can't wait to see what else we can achieve together.

In September 2022, during Gynaecological Cancer Awareness Month, Cure Our Ovarian Cancer submitted a report to the Health Select Committee for consideration. This report is the most comprehensive report on ovarian cancer in New Zealand ever published and it paints a damning picture of the current situation in New Zealand.

TALK PEACH GYNAECOLOGICAL FOUNDATION

Diagnosed in 2016 with ovarian cancer, Talk Peach founder Tash Crosby is one of only 15% of women caught at stage one; 85% of women diagnosed are caught in the later stages of the disease when treatment options are limited, and rates of survival extremely poor.

Out of the 1000 New Zealanders diagnosed per year with a gynaecological cancer, a third of them will have ovarian cancer - the deadliest type - with an average of five year survival rate of around 40 per cent. To compare, breast cancers have a five year survival rate of more than 80 per cent.

Talk Peach is there to educate the public on the early and often subtle signs of gynaecological cancers, and to empower people to advocate for their health. They are also there to help those who have been diagnosed, to ask the right questions, and advocate for themselves if they aren't being listened to.

Talk Peach has the goal to upskill the public and health professionals, as well as to empower people to take ownership of their gynaecological health.

The best chance of survival is an early detection, know the signs and help us save New Zealanders and their whanau the heartbreak of a late stage diagnosis.

VISION

To inform New Zealanders on gynaecological disease and connect and support those who are diagnosed.

MISSION

- To provide education on gynaecological health.
- To educate the community on the signs and symptoms of the 5 gyanecological cancers in order to reduce late diagnosis.
- To provide information and support to all those diagnosed with gynaecological cancers.
- To support those involved with lifesaving research into gynaecological cancer treatment and cures.
- To advocate for better funding into: education and awareness, research, clinical trials, access to medications, and better pathways to diagnostic testing.

New Zealand has one of the highest rates of cancer in the world. I was determined to create an opportunity where there were no barriers for an early diagnostic test. We know early detection can lead to earlier treatment which gives an opportunity for a better outcome. I firmly believe that highly trained dogs can assist our health system and support medical professionals. They do not discriminate, so age, ethnicity or financial status has no bearing on using dogs as a diagnostic tool. Dogs have the potential to save lives.

Over the last five years K9MD has developed protocols and methodologies for the use of canines as a diagnostic tool. This has resulted in 100% success for dogs completing their proof of concept validations for bowel cancer and prostate cancer detection in various concentration ratios. We have been delighted that our work is now recognized internationally.



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Now, with generous support from incredible women of New Zealand and Soroptimists, German shepherd Hunter (Pulse von Heisenberg) has joined our canine team as New Zealand's first ovarian cancer detection dog. This is an exciting start for our ovarian cancer research. Hunter is everything we look for in our dogs; bold, confident, always happy with a well-balanced temperament. And of course - good looking. We know he will be a top medical detection dog and become women's best friend.

The New Zealand National Project ovarian cancer has enabled each club to participate in any way they feel appropriate towards achieving the project objectives of education, advocacy and funding.

When this project started just over a year ago many of us, including me, were not aware of the lack of funding for research; access to affordability of diagnostics and treatment of this disease.

Clubs have undertaken many varied activities to get the message across to women in the community about the need to be vigilant and aware of the symptoms of ovarian cancer so they can increase their chances of having the disease diagnosed earlier. I recall one of the main reasons this project touched so many of us and still does, is that early diagnosis can save women's lives.

Congratulations to all clubs all for raising awareness in your communities about this disease. I can see from the information in the report there has been an array of activities from breakfasts to high teas and even raffles to get the message across and raising an amazing \$20,000+ funds.

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
